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PRESIDENT'S REPORT



Kaya WASCA members and special guests

Wandjoo, thank you for attending the WASCA Annual General Meeting. It is good to be able to meet in person here on Whadjuk Noongar boodjar, I acknowledge and pay respect to all Noongar Elders who have cared for this land and its people for tens of thousands of years. A warm welcome to our life members, school members, and special guests. A special thank you to our staff and Board members who will be offering their expertise today during our Q&A session after the meeting and have provided our delicious morning tea.



The 2021/2022 financial year was again one of significant change for WASCA. This year however, we were expecting to make adjustments to business, we just didn't know in what context. In December 2021 WASCA submitted a tender for the Department of Health's Whole of School Healthy Eating program. Knowing any outcome would spell significant change, the Board began to prepare. We implemented actions to strengthen governance practice and processes which included formal training and regular review and knowledge sharing of current best practice in not-for-profit governance.

During the year Board members have been active in supporting the 2019-2022 strategic plan through mentoring and supporting members, member and partner engagement and networking, reviewing resources, volunteering in member school canteens, undertaking regular training and development in good governance, and advocating for improved nutrition and food security for children.

In October 2021 the Board and staff attended a full day governance training and planning session. Our individual and collective strengths were assessed and opportunities for improvement identified. Actions arising from this session included the introduction of an annual Board appraisal process, a review of Board meeting process and protocols, and the formation of two sub-committees, one to perform a full review of the WASCA constitution and one to investigate the development of a WASCA Reconciliation Action Plan (RAP).



The constitution review is complete, proposed amendments have been provided to members and will be voted on during this AGM. Findings from the RAP sub-committee were that WASCA is not currently in a position to develop a formal RAP, however, is committed to being an inclusive organisation, and this will be reflected in the 2022-2027 strategic plan.

In May 2022, WASCA was informed that the tender for the Whole of School Healthy Eating Program was awarded to Nutrition Australia Victoria. In response, the Board attended a special meeting to discuss the outcome, and to ensure appropriate support was afforded to the CEO as necessary operational changes were considered and implemented. The professionalism and dedication of the CEO and all other WASCA staff this year is acknowledged and appreciated. It was with sadness we farewelled office staff during the year, I wish them all well in their new endeavours – both in careers and new families.

General agreement was that the outcome of the tender submission was unexpected and disappointing, however, WACSA still has a critical role to play in supporting healthy eating and business operations of canteens in the school setting. We were encouraged by the level of disappointment and offers of support from our peers, partners and other stakeholders and have taken the opportunity to review and reset our strategic direction.

An extensive strategic and business planning process commenced in August 2022. An external facilitator was engaged to guide collaboration between the Board, WASCA members, partners, and staff to develop the 2022-2027 strategic business plan. I am pleased to present WASCA's strategic objectives for the next five years. These build upon the 2019-2022 strategic goals and provide a clear and exciting path for WASCA to follow over the next five years.



This year the Board has remained vibrant and diverse, with representation from canteen supervisors and volunteers, P&C members, health promotion practitioners and teaching staff. Our Board members bring with them different experiences and viewpoints and it has again been an honour to lead a team which has delivered balanced and reasoned governance during a time of significant challenge and change. I look forward to welcoming new board members this morning and working together as we continue to serve this vital organisation.

CEO REPORT



I always enjoy writing the annual report. It is an opportunity to take the time to look back at the year that was and acknowledge the achievements of our organisation. In looking back, we can consider what worked really well, what didn't, and what do we want to do more of in the future. As the AGM is being held later than normal, this report includes a summary from 1 July 2021 to 1 December 2022.




Raising the profile of WASCA, and those we work with is a key strategy in the strategic plan.

The WASCA website was updated and has significantly easier navigation and ensures resources are easier to locate and download. Major changes to increase usability are:

- Search function for recipe by ingredient or name, save or print capacity
- Recipe page with visual representation of the recipe and colour coding
- Greater categorisation of sub tabs.





Promoting outstanding schools and community venues/events was important. For example:

- CanTeam newsletter and guest speakers at General Meetings included:
 - Applecross Senior High School focusing on building morale and better relationships across the school community
 - Liwara Primary School focusing on outstanding canteen promotions to engage students, families and staff and achieving 4-star StarCAP2
 - Hillcrest Primary School focusing on leading sustainability practices
 - Coogee Primary School case study on operating a canteen and marketing.
- WASCA Wednesday Facebook posts promoting the excellent work from n=24 schools, such as:
 - Oakwood Primary School shared their strategy to increase online ordering and engaging with the school community
 - WASCA board members visiting schools and volunteering in canteens
 - Melville Senior High School promoting their popular green recipes
 - Star of the Sea Primary School with advice on how to promote healthy menu items such as fruit salads when clear plastics are no longer in use.
- Fuel to Go & Play® case studies
 - Pearl Coast Gymnastic, with a focus on increasing green items on the menu
 - National Rugby League WA Harmony Cup, showcasing a comprehensive healthy food environment.



WASCA increased our advocacy activities and focus.

- WASCA is part of an NGO Obesity Consensus Group
 - This is a with other non-government organisations including Cancer Council WA, Heart Foundation, Aust. Medical Association, Aust.
 Dental Association, Diabetes WA, Public Health Advocacy Institute, and Telethon Kids Institute
 - During the year WASCA was a signatory on a number of letters addressing issues around junk food advertising to children, advocating of the release of the National Obesity Policy and letters of support for funding applications.



WASCA developed four submissions including:

National Obesity

Our response raised issues regarding reducing access to unhealthy
food and drinks around schools; and strongly supporting the
action to 'establish whole-of-school/facility policies and practices
to support healthy behaviours and skills.

Infrastructure WA, State Infrastructure Strategy Submission focused on advocating for a greater regard for the built food environment around schools (i.e. fast food and alcohol outlets within close proximity to schools). Schools should be planned, sited and developed in a way that will facilitate the creation of health-promoting environments and thus healthier behaviours.

Education and Health Standing Committee

Submission on the Inquiry into the response of WA schools to climate change.

Commissioner for Children and Young People

Submission to the Joint Standing Committee on the inquiry into the most effective ways for Western Australia to address food insecurity for children and young people affected by poverty; this led to a subsequent public hearing with WASCA stakeholders.

Strengthening partnerships was a key focus.

Thank you to partner organisations and funding bodies Department of Education, Department of Health and Healthway. Your ongoing support of our Association is appreciated.

I thank Cancer Council WA and Foodbank WA for their regular contribution to the CanTeam newsletter and social media collaboration, and the WA Health Promoting Schools Association for their collaboration and support.

We continue to foster the valuable relationship with the WA Council of State School Organisations (WACSSO). This included regular meetings between staff and board/councillors, networking with P&C representatives at the WACSSO Annual Conference (pictured) and cross-promotion and collaboration via social media, eNews and newsletters.



Membership review and update

This year, we considered your feedback, reviewed the most common questions we are asked, and conducted an environmental scan of other support services available. Based on these findings we have revised our membership categories and services.

We believe the comprehensive quality services available to members will ensure food services in WA feel supported, valued and empowered to create healthy food environments and operate viable business.

PROJECTS



Healthy Food and Drink project

In June 2022, WASCA finalised the contract with the Department of Health to provide support, advice, training and resources to assist schools in implementing the Department of Education's *Healthy Food and Drink* (HFD) policy (2018-2022).

Significant achievements and activities in the final year of the project included:

- Advisory service provided to 332 schools on 705 occasions
- 217 menu, product and recipe assessments
- 7 canteen consultancies
- 620 people completed training either online or during 13 face to face/video conference training and capacity building sessions
- Training evaluations show
 - 9 in 10 training participants reported being very/extremely satisfied
 - A greater proportion of all participants agree/strongly agree with the following statements post training compared top pre training:
 - HFD policy is important for the health and wellbeing of the school community (93% vs 96%)
 - I have good knowledge of the core areas of the HFD policy; and menu requirements (75% vs 96%)
 - I am confident to implement the HFD policy (86% vs 96%)
 - Good knowledge of food safety and hygiene practices (93% vs 100%)
 - Confident to implement food safety and hygiene practices (92% vs 100%)
 - Good knowledge of how to operate a financially viable canteen (50% vs 100%)
 - Confident to implement financial management practices (62% vs 95%)
 - 4,610 families participated in 120 kindy orientation sessions
 - Almost 14,000 families (n=13,877) participated in kindy sessions over the 4-year contract
 - WASCA's kindy orientation video as been viewed 3,074 time since development in 2020
 - 59 new tools and resources developed, including 8 videos
 - WASCA participated in numerous activities to assist the Department of Education, including
 - Healthy Food and Drink in Public Schools (HFD) policy review, to be merged with the Student Health Care policy; due for release 2023
 - In addition to the requirement for all paid and volunteer canteen staff to complete FoodSafe® Food Handler training; there will be a new mandatory requirement to complete All About Allergens; this was supported by WASCA and WACSSO



- WASCA liaised with the DOE Workforce Management team to review 3 canteen business case submissions
- WASCA had significant engagement with the Sustainability Unit regarding the single-use plastics ban, cross promotion and case studies
- WASCA provided advice regarding clarifying the mandatory COVID-19 vaccination guidelines for Canteen staff and P&C's and volunteers.





Community Nutrition Services, funded by Healthway

WASCA has worked in partnership with Healthway for many years implementing a range of projects. In October 2021, these projects were combined under the *Community Nutrition Services* contract.

This allows for greater synergies and increased sustainability across various settings and partnerships that aim to create healthy food environments utilising a suite of Fuel to Go & Play® tools and resources to support healthy eating in the community.

ONLINE HUB

- Development of a comprehensive online hub with content tailored to each of the project's target groups,
- 71% increase in website visitors (compared to the previous 12 months)
- 66 new venues were added to the portal
- Online training
 - Continued to offer Canteen and food service staff training (n=103 completed) and Health Professional training (n=7 completed)
 - Launched new Club officials and stakeholder training for sporting clubs (n= 28 completed training)
 - Pre and post training surveys indicate that:
 - 98% (n=123) of participants were satisfied with the training
 - 100% (n=125) showed an increase in knowledge, confidence and motivation
 - Secondary evaluation (survey approximately 6 months after completing training):
 - 79% (n=15) of respondents had implemented changes, the most significant change being increasing the availability of water and reducing confectionary.





SOCIAL MEDIA

- Social media policy and social media strategy was developed and implemented
- Posts focus on:
 - Target settings e.g. sports clubs, community events, State
 Sporting Associations
 - Fuel to Go & Play® services, resources and case studies
 - Nutrition information and tools.

SUPPORT SERVICES

- Healthy Sports Grants Supported 21 clubs with canteen reform during the Summer 2021/22 season
- Healthy Sports Program (commenced in 2022) -Currently supporting 22 clubs
- Healthy Venue Grants Supported 5 venues with meeting the grant requirements
- Community Events Supported 28 organisations with creating 41 healthier community events
 - Worked with 230 food trucks and caterers to ensure healthy options were available; including 112 menu reviews
 - Increased focus on removal and/or non display of sugary drinks
 - o 94% of event organisers surveyed used the Healthier Vendor Guide to seek healthier vendors
 - 70% of event organisers would offer incentives to encourage healthier vendors for future events i.e. promote healthy vendors, reduce stallholder fees etc.


State Sporting Associations and Racing Organisations

- Supported 5 Racing and 9 State Sporting Associations
- o Increased focus on Fuel to Go & Play® brand and key messages
- Feedback includes: "Gained genuine 'buy in' from most of our clubs, especially the bigger, most well managed clubs". As a result, these clubs... "have made significant changes to their club food and beverage menu's which has proven very well received by their customers/attendees as reflected in their sales of the healthier options that they have made available as a result of the partnership".
- o Facilitated two nutrition workshops, one for parents and one for junior swimmers
- Developed sports nutrition social media toolkit, information for newsletters and fact sheets to promote healthy eating for best performance.









ACCREDITATION PROGRAM

- The program includes 26 venues. The majority (96%, n=25) have achieved Level 1, and one venue achieved Level 3
- The majority (54%, n=14) of participants were generated from completing the Healthy Sports Grants acquittal process and transitioning to accreditation; followed by State Sporting Association engagement e.g. Netball WA, (35%, n=9)
- A video case study was developed to promote Perth Netball Association's accreditation and is housed on the website.

OTHER SIGNIFICANT ACHIEVEMENTS

- Established National Community Nutrition Network (n=13) participants
- Fuel to Go & Play® featured on the World Obesity Federation's 2022 World Obesity Day website
- ECU's Refresh.ED used Fuel to Go & Play® resources for Food for Sport learning modules for teachers.

Canteen Day

We launched the inaugural Canteen Day in WA, 4 November 2022. Canteen Day will be held on the first Friday in November each year to celebrate school canteens and pay tribute to canteen staff and volunteers. This is a WASCA initiative with the support of the Department of Education.



Canteen Day is an opportunity to thank our canteen staff and volunteers. When they work together with parents, teachers and students, the canteen becomes a focal point for the food and nutrition education that supports and reinforces what students learn at home, classroom and in the community.

This year's them was 'Thanks a bunch' and WASCA developed a range of tools and resources for school to use, such as a certificate template, thank you cards, newsletter inserts, graphics and social media tiles. The most used resource was a flower colouring-in sheet, as you can see the effect was sensational.



The response was overwhelming. We loved seeing all the photos and comments on Facebook. So what did canteen staff think about canteen day?

"When the kids bought their flowers up to the canteen it felt like Christmas"

"Thanks WASCA!"

"Had an awesome day full of appreciation here, thanks for helping us all achieve that!"

"We were given a book filled with thank you messages"




Awards and grants

The Robin Bromley Visionary Grants aims to empower Canteen Supervisors to undertake professional development and training and/or enhance the canteen by purchasing essential equipment with funds provided by this program. The program has been running for eight years.

Together with our sponsors we have provided \$24,000 to schools in WA to assist in the provision of healthy food and drink choices. For the past six years this initiative has been in partnership with Brownes Dairy.

The three schools who were successful applicants in 2021 were Coogee Primary School, Nollamara Primary School and Orelia Primary School.

Star Choice[™] food registration program

The Star Choice™ Buyers Guide is published in January and July each year. The Guide is a register of manufactured products that makes it easier for school canteens and community venues, to stock and promote healthier choices of a wide range of food and drinks.

The July 2022 edition of the Guide had a new look and new features, including:

- An updated overview of the purpose of the Guide, including the traffic light system of colour coding food and drinks
- A summary of WASCA's Fuel to Go & Play® initiative, in partnership with Healthway, that supports community venues e.g. sporting clubs, recreation centres, entertainment venues and events
- All items have been colour coded for schools as well as community venues
- A useful calendar of events to help school and community plan special promotions and raise awareness of important issues
- PLUS, there were over 50 new products!

We thank the manufacturers and distributors for their ongoing support of our organisation, our members and partners.
