Volunteer Resource Centres: a great way to engage with volunteers

There are a number of <u>Volunteer Resource Centres</u> located throughout WA, often associated with local councils. They can provide support, training and assistance to groups looking for volunteers.

Some of the services they offer:

- Free online listing of your volunteer positions
- Referral of potential volunteers
- Promotion of your volunteer vacancies in the centre and throughout the community
- Training, information and resources relating to volunteering

- Best practice volunteer management advice
- Interaction with other volunteering websites in order to expose a wider range of potential volunteers to your vacancies.

How to get started:

- Go to your local council website; the City of Melville and the City of Swan have great pages dedicated to volunteering
- Locate the position description and registration forms. Use these to provide a good description of the volunteer role and any requirements that you wish the volunteer to have. For example, age requirements, police clearance, Working with Children Check, Criminal History Check etc.
- Email the forms back to the centre
- Once the paperwork has been received they will confirm via email and commence promotion of your position.

Melville Volunteer Resource Centre

The Melville Volunteer Resource Centre (MVRC), is a free service of the City of Melville, and part-funded by the Department for Local Government and Communities. Their role is to assist not-for-profit organisations and government departments within the City of Melville and in the wider South Metropolitan area with the promotion of volunteer positions and the matching of suitable volunteers.

They promote volunteer positions and agencies via an online database which is linked to National Volunteer Databases and the City of Melville website, and to walk in and telephone clients.

Training and networking opportunities for Volunteer Managers are also offered to agencies that are aligned with their service. Training courses have included Dealing with difficult volunteers, Understanding and engaging 21st Century volunteer & social media, and a workshop on attracting volunteers. They also hold an annual Volunteer Recognition Event and Mayor's Valued Citizen Awards which celebrates volunteers and volunteering within the City of Melville.

You can subscribe to receive their monthly City of Melville Volunteer eNewsletter that details a variety of volunteer positions, Particularly those that are new or are listed as urgent. It also details up-and-coming events that are seeking the assistance of volunteers and events that the general community can attend. Schools in all areas are encouraged to subscribe to the eNewsletter.

Keeping and thanking your volunteers

- Hosting a morning tea for all school volunteers
- Thank volunteers at an assembly in front of the whole school community, honour the work they do; for canteen volunteers this means acknowledging the huge effort to provide delicious and nutritious food for the school community
- Nominate the person with the highest volunteer hours for a month or term as the school hero
- For school canteens nominate canteen volunteers for <u>WASCA'S Nan Marlow Award for</u> <u>Excellence in Volunteering</u>, supported by Just Pizza Company.
